Jasper Community Arts is pleased to present one of the first exhibitions at the Thyen-Clark Cultural Center of John Mellencamp's Paintings and Assemblages.

The creative spirit often finds multiple expressions and such is the case with John Mellencamp. Known primarily for his music, Mellencamp, is a legendary musician and long time activist. He is a member of the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame and recipient of The Woody Guthrie Award.

He is also an accomplished painter who has seriously pursued painting for more than 35 years. He has had solo exhibitions at the Butler Institute of American Art, Youngstown, Ohio; the Tennessee State Museum, Nashville, the Museum of Art—Deland, Florida, the Morris Museum of Art, Augusta, Georgia and three exhibits including a two man exhibition with Robert Rauschenberg at the famed ACA Galleries in New York City.

Raised in Indiana and influenced by his mother who painted in the family home throughout his childhood, Mellencamp's urge to paint started at ten years old when he began experimenting with oils. Later, he came to New York with the intention of studying painting if his music-career aspirations didn't pan out. He had his first formal training at the Art Students League, with portraitist David Leffel, where he discovered German art and the work of Twentieth - Century Modernists such as Walt Kuhn, Chaim Soutine and Max Beckmann.

As his musical career flourished, Mellencamp also continued painting and began to paint earnestly in the 1980s as a means of further artistic exploration. He evolved a style of portraiture influenced by the paintings of the German Expressionists, particularly Max Beckmann and Otto Dix.

Beginning with an early affinity for portraiture Mellencamp found his visual voice in Expressionism. The German Expressionism of the early twentieth century, with its anguish over human brutality and corruption, spoke to Mellencamp's deep feelings about social justice. His kinship with the Expressionist artists, both by inheritance—he is the descendant of German immigrants—and attitude, served as the foundation for the development of Mellencamp's own oeuvre. But though that foundation is German, the evolved result is decidedly American, with the brash and snappy visual rhythms of our streets, our lives, our politics, angers and passions.

Mellencamp's imagery thus takes its inspiration from the same sources as his music: the struggles of the working man and woman, oppressive authority and social struggle. And like his music, the paintings are carefully composed through the structural requirements of harmony, rhythm and order.

Mellencamp continues to live in his native Indiana, where he maintains his home and studio outside Bloomington, where painting continues to be a mainstay of his creative spirit.

About John Mellencamp

Born and raised in Seymour, Indiana, John Mellencamp is an acclaimed singer-songwriter and musician, as well as an accomplished painter and long-time activist. Mellencamp started painting at an early age, influenced by his mother, also an artist. Mellencamp studied briefly at the Arts Student League in New York, where he discovered the work of Twentieth-Century Modernists. As his musical career flourished, Mellencamp began to paint earnestly in the 1980s with an early affinity for portraiture influenced by the works of Otto Dix and Max Beckmann. He is a member of the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, a Grammy winner, recipient of The Woody Guthrie Award, the John Steinbeck Award, ASCAP Foundation's Champion Award, the Americana Music Association's Lifetime Achievement Award, the Founders Award, a member of the Songwriters Hall of Fame and co-founder of Farm Aid – a nonprofit organization whose mission is to keep family farmers on the land. www.johnmellencampart.com | @johnmellencamp



SUBJECT: GERRY WUBBEN EXHIBIT AT THE THYEN-CLARK CULTURAL CENTER

EXHIBIT DATES: JANUARY 7th – FEBRUARY 26th, 2021

Jasper Community Arts is pleased to present one of the first exhibitions at the Thyen-Clark Cultural Center, Easley, South Carolina charcoal artist, Gerry Wubben.

An Indiana University graduate has made his way back to display his larger than life, highly detailed, charcoal drawings.

Wubben states, "My work, more than anything else, is a way for me to explore and make sense of my world through visual means. These means include realistic and abstract imagery, and disciplines such as drawing, printmaking, painting, sculpture, digital imagery, and theatre work.

My realistic work mainly manifests itself with my drawings, which are primarily monumental and executed in charcoal. I am constantly looking for things that strike me visually such as the figure, faces, and studies of Nature."

"Of all of my subjects I find the figure to be the most powerful vehicle to express my ideas and feelings," says Wubben. He tends to draw family or friends and either focus on the old or the new born. "My drawings of people strive to depict the soul of the person and speak of the cycle of life of which we are all a part. My drawings of Nature (landscape, insects, and animals) tend to be objective studies that share with the viewer my fascination with texture and detail. I like to work large for the impact and often use my drawings as theater sets. A design I created of Waiting For Godot was composed of my drawings which stretched fifty feet across the stage," Wubben said.

Wubben states, "My abstract work manifests itself primarily in etchings, assemblages and monumental paintings. This body of work is based mainly on maps and my love of scientific subject matter. My most recent body of work consists of very large canvases with highly structured circular patterns painted in acrylic paint. I am trying to convey what I see in my mind when I read about the big bang, black holes, atomic structures, snow flake patterns and so on. I am also referring to Islamic Art, Indian Art, and Mandalas."

I have chosen to work in several directions for a couple of reasons. First of all, I like to challenge myself artistically. Each drawing or painting I do is done partly for the difficulty it presents me. If I succeed, I am that much stronger of an artist. Secondly, I see the world in a way that can best be described in two major areas: realistically and structured abstractions. I was made to do both.

Gerry Wubben holds a Master of Fine Arts in Printmaking from Indiana University, a BFA in Printmaking from Colorado State University and an AA from Mesa College.
